KEY MESSAGES

The Sugar mill safety Code of Practice 2024 and its cane rail safety supplement commenced on 23 September 2024. The new code has been remade following a review supported by two respective steering groups, one for milling and one for cane transport. Each group was comprised of industry representatives, worker representatives and technical experts.

The focus of the review was to ensure the content continues to effectively guide the sugar industry on how duty holders can achieve the standard of health, safety and welfare required under the *Work Health and Safety Act 2011* and *Work Health and Safety Regulation 2011*.

These changes have been supported by steering group members and are primarily based on modernising the content to ensure it is reflective of current industry best practice.

A notable update is the inclusion of specific guidance in relation to the use of perimeter fencing to manage the risks of cane bin collision with workers or other mobile plant.
